MESSAGE FROM BOARD CHAIR & CEO

On behalf of A & O: Support Services for Older Adults we are pleased to present this year's Annual Report which highlights some of our accomplishments over the past year. Not only does this annual report provide you with information on our continually expanding specialized programs, services and important core work, this report officially represents the agency as a specialized service provider for older Manitobans.

We continue to build on our pillars of service:

Safety & Security The Third International Longevity Forum was held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil this past fall. The President of the Canadian Longevity Centre presented on the innovative work taking place in Canada related to the Age Friendly Initiative. Information about the agency's safety and security programs (Elder Abuse Prevention, Safe Suites, Senior's Abuse Support Line, Older Victim Services, SafetyAid and This Full House) were shared to demonstrate the innovative work taking place in Canada.

The agency hosted the Staying Safe: for the Deaf & Hard of Hearing conference in the spring, A & O was invited to be a member of the Shelter Partners, Regional, National & Global (SPRiNG) Alliance. This group meets annually to discuss best practices for shelter providers for older adults experiencing abuse. The Entry Program presented at the Manitoba Institute for Patient Safety annual general meeting regarding curriculum they developed that focused on health and safety. This past year agency staff recertified or certified their first aid and CPR training.

Social Engagement Members of the management team presented information about the agency's Connect Program and related social engagement initiatives at the annual Support Services for Seniors Planning day hosted by the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority.

Counselling This past year the agency's Registered Social Workers and Intake team received intensive training related to vicarious trauma and mindfulness integrated cognitive behavior therapy. The agency was also pleased to offer a 15 week Buried in Treasures Support Group for clients dealing with Hoarding Disorder and a six (6) week Making & Keeping Important Connections Support Group.

Special Initiatives / Partnerships The agency continues to go global! Last fall, members of the management team had the opportunity to present on the agency's specialized services to a delegation from Setagaya, Japan which is Winnipeg's sister city.

A & O hosted a number of special events including the Annual 55+ Housing & Active Lifestyles Expo which expanded to offer more booths, the community services volunteer recognition event was held at Prairie 360, and the ever popular Be a Santa to a Senior Program provided holiday gifts to over 930 isolated older adults living in Winnipeg.

A valuable partnership was formalized between the Winnipeg Fire Paramedic Service (WFPS) and the SafetyAid Program to support the installation of smoke alarms as part of the program when necessary.

This past spring the agency was pleased to welcome Myers Weinberg LLP to provide legal services on-site to individuals 55 years of age and older on matters such as wills, powers of attorney and health care directives.

A & O is fortunate to have wonderfully committed and knowledgeable staff. This past year the agency made a concerted effort to offer two unique staff development opportunities where all staff met off-site to enjoy some quality time with their colleagues. The first event was offered in early September at which staff enjoyed a luncheon followed by an afternoon scavenger hunt at the Forks, the second was a breakfast followed by a tour of the Canadian Museum for Human Rights. This fiscal year also saw the agency complete the final pieces to its rebranding process with a new domain name and the launch of a Facebook page and Twitter account.

Thank you to our core funders; the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority, the Province of Manitoba, the United Way of Winnipeg, Immigration Refugees and Citizenship Canada and the City of Winnipeg. In addition to our core funders a significant amount of work undertaken by A & O continues to occur through project based funding provided

by many financial supporters. Your financial support allows the agency to provide additional supports to our programs and services and we thank you for your ongoing commitment.

SAFETY & SECURITY

ELDER ABUSE

The agency provides direct Elder Abuse prevention services and receives referrals for the following: consulting around Elder Abuse issues, one-on-one support and counselling, Safe Suite Program referrals, communication support group for older parents / grandparent, assistance with Protection Orders and more.

In this past year, A & O Registered Social Workers provided assistance to over 380 clients, and in total spent 1,300 hours in Elder Abuse related work which includes direct and indirect client contact, workshops, committees and other related activities.



A & O: Support Services for Older Adults continues to be involved in many elder abuse prevention initiatives. Some of which include, acting as cochair for the Winnipeg Elder Abuse Strategy as well as for the World Elder Abuse Awareness Day committee.

SAFE SUITE

The agency worked with 82 clients in the Safe Suite Program in 2015-16. Nine individuals entered a Safe Suite in order to leave an abusive living situation. Clients receive long-term counselling support from Registered Social Workers and assistance with legal, financial and housing options.

SENIOR'S ABUSE SUPPORT LINE

A & O: Support Services for Older Adults continues to partner with Klinic Community Health Centre to provide a 24 hour Elder Abuse support line for individuals across Manitoba. This 24 hour support line was launched on March 1, 2010. In this past year, the agency assisted in handling 430 elder abuse calls through the Senior's Abuse Support Line.



THIS FULL HOUSE



The agency continues to receive funding from the United Way of Winnipeg to provide support for the This Full House Program. This Full House is able to assist older Winnipeggers living with Hoarding Disorder. Agency Social Workers provide support, counselling, advocacy, access to cleaning and long-term maintenance and follow-up. The program continued to provide the Buried in Treasures support group this past year.

As a result of the program, clients are able to receive services in home which had previously refused to assist them. Clients also become successfully engaged in their community and social networks. In this past year, the program received 195 new referrals, worked with an average of 86 past clients each month, and provided over 1,300 service hours.

SAFETYAID: CRIME AND FALLS PREVENTION FOR OLDER MANITOBANS

SafetyAid provides older Manitobans with crime and falls prevention audits of their home and property. Older adults that have been victims of a break-in or home invasion, as well as low income older adults, are able to receive safety and falls prevention supplies installed at no cost.

In this past year, a partnership was developed between A & O and the Winnipeg Fire Paramedic Service (WFPS). WFPS will provide support to A & O in the form of education on proper installation of smoke alarms which will assist with this aspect of the home audit.

This year the SafetyAid program provided the following services:

- 384 crime and falls prevention audits
- 345 clients received free installation of security devices. such as deadbolts, peepholes and swing bars
- 345 individuals were provided with fall prevention supplies, including non-slip bath-mats, ice melt, ice-grip tips for canes, nightlights and flashlights

OLDER VICTIM SERVICES

Through a partnership with the Winnipeg Police Victim Services Unit and Manitoba Justice, agency Registered Social Workers and volunteers provided support to 306 victims of crime in 2015 -16. Clients received counselling and practical support, assistance with Victim Impact Statements and applying for compensation. In addition, Social Workers provide assistance with navigating the criminal justice system through court updates and by attending court with clients.

STAYING SAFE FOR THE DEAF & HARD OF HEARING

On April 21, 2015, A & O hosted 'Staying Safe: For the Deaf & Hard of Hearing' for older adults from the Deaf, Hard of Hearing and Deaf-Blind Communities. Over 100 participants took part in this educational symposium which included a safety presentation from the Winnipeg Police Service, a presentation on A & O services and a panel discussion on making victim services more inclusive and accessible. Funding was provided by a National Victims of Crime Awareness Week grant from Justice Canada. We would like to thank our committee partners that helped us to offer this event:

SOCIAL ENGAGEMENT

SENIOR CENTRE WITHOUT WALLS

The program continues to grow and this year held 608 classes, a 16% increase over 2014-15. We continue to add new programming recommended by the program participants. Popular sessions offered via teleconference include Music Therapy, Art Therapy, museum tours, book clubs and support groups.



CONNECT

Our Registered Social Workers assisted 267 socially isolated older adults; connecting them to resources that facilitate independent living. 183 clients were matched with volunteers for regular visits and calls. A team of 130 dedicated volunteers provided 10,140 hours of visits and phone calls to program clients. Last May, we launched a new Connect group, Making and Keeping Important Connections. The qoals group include enriching social skills, heightening positive self-esteem and generating affirmative relations.



ENTRY PROGRAM FOR OLDER ADULTS

This year 97 individuals completed our Entry Program, which offers a settlement orientation for newcomers who are 55 plus. These 10 week sessions help newcomers adjust to their new life in Canada and learn important information they will need to help them successfully integrate into Canadian society. The Entry sessions are offered at various locations throughout the city, four times per year.



Upon completion of the Entry session, participants are encouraged to join one of our 16 English Conversation Circles (ECCs) located throughout Winnipeg. The ECCs are an opportunity for participants to meet other newcomers in their community, become aware of and have access to community resources and apply their English language skills in an informal and supportive setting. Over 280 participants from 46 countries around the world participated in the conversation circles this year, with China, Bhutan and Israel being our top three source countries.

SUMMER CLUBS: In the summer of 2015 we offered our ESL Summer Clubs for a 5 week term. from June 22 to July 24, 2015. We had ten classes and over 130 participants. Thanks to the University of Manitoba and the University of Winnipeg's Teaching ESL Certificate programs for providing the teachers.

HUMAN RESOURCES: The Entry team is made up of two ESL Specialists. whose role is to support and train the volunteers, two orientation facilitators,




one program assistant and one program manager. This year Entry staff produced three volunteer newsletters, offered seven volunteer training events and hosted a volunteer recognition luncheon. Eleven new lesson plans were developed and added to the Entry curriculum, which is now available on A & O's website.

Most importantly, more than 60 dedicated volunteers contributed over 1,600 hours to our program as ECC facilitators. Entry assistants, office assistants and interpreters.

THANK YOU to our major funder, Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada, (formerly Citizenship and Immigration Canada) as well as many community partners who provided space in kind and/or their time and expertise to make this program possible.





COUNSELLING

COUNSELLING

The agency's counselling services provides both individual and group counselling to individuals 55 and older. This past year, the program received over 410 new referrals/intake calls, and worked with 128 past clients each month. Focus areas included: bereavement, loneliness, depression, family conflict and many others. The agency's Registered Social Workers provided 1,200 hours to the counselling program.

HOUSING PROGRAM

The Housing Program continues to address the needs of older adults investigating housing options in the Winnipeg area. The program also receives regular inquiries from across the country and the United States. The Housing Consultant provides personal consultations to individuals, couples, and families. Consultations assist with meeting the demand for in-depth housing information and tips on how to navigate the low vacancy rate housing market that currently exists. Consultations were provided; in person, by phone or via email to 955 individuals last year. Every effort is made to provide appropriate resources and information to assist older adults in a successful search for their next home. Clients are educated on the different levels of housing available, including Independent Living, Assisted Living, Companion Care, Supportive Housing and Personal Care Homes.

The program also publishes the Winnipeg Housing Directory for Older Adults, a comprehensive guide of housing options including, rental and utility costs as well as building security and amenities. The guide is available for purchase at A & O and it is available on our website.

8TH ANNUAL 55+ HOUSING & ACTIVE LIFESTYLES EXPO

The 8th Annual 55+ Housing & Active Lifestyles Expo welcomed over 950 individuals and showcased 88 booths at this exciting information packed day! Event attendees had the opportunity to meet with exhibitors and explore the plethora of housing and active living related options that are available to older adults. The expo was advertised in a variety of publications, including the Winnipeg Free Press, Lifestyles 55+, Go 55+ and Senior Scope. Advertisements were also posted on Global and CTV News websites and the Winnipeg Sun's website. A number of public service announcements were conducted, as well as radio spots on CJNU and CJOB.

PARTNERSHIP PROGRAMS

LEGAL SERVICES

In December 2015 Derek Alexander retired from providing legal services on-site at A & O. Mr. Alexander had worked out of the agency's offices for over thirty years providing a valuable service to many older adults.

Myers Weinberg LLP started providing legal services on-site at A & O to older adults 55 years of age and older in March, 2016. They provide legal services on matters such as wills, powers of attorney and health care directives. Myers Weinberg are on-site every Wednesday and Thursday from 1:00 - 4:00 pm. These services are in high demand therefore, clients are encouraged to make appointments ahead of time and allow approximately one month for the processing of all documents.

INCOME TAX CLINICS

The agency partnered with the Chartered Professional Accountants Manitoba and community organizations to provide an income tax return program for older adults. Sessions were held in accessible locations throughout the city. Through this invaluable service, lower income older adults have the opportunity to have their tax returns completed by a professional accountant at no cost.

- Tool Tote Draw: A handmade tool tote filled with goodies was raffled off, with tickets going for \$2 each, all proceeds went to the United Way


