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MESSAGE FROM BOARD CHAIR & CEO

As a specialized service provider for older Manitobans, we are pleased to present the 2020-2021 Annual Report, which highlights some of our accomplishments over the past year. We continue to build on our pillars of service, Safety & Security, Social Engagement and Counselling.

Over the last year agency staff, board and volunteers have risen to the challenge and far exceeded it in providing support to older Manitobans in aging well during a very trying period. Due to population aging, we have known that the agency's programs and services are critical in supporting older adults in aging well. However, the Covid-19 pandemic has amplified this need, demonstrating that the agency's innovative programs and services are more important than ever before.

The agency is supporting older adults during the Covid-19 pandemic through the delivery of specialized programs and services including the 311 Food Security Line, Senior Centre Without Walls (SCWW), Senior Immigrant Settlement Services' online classes and settlement support as well as the distribution of Wellness Kits. This innovative programming is critical as it provides access to healthy food; wellness supplies and opportunities for meaningful social engagement that let older adults know they are not alone. Opportunities for social engagement have been a critical lifeline for many participants during a very lengthy pandemic.

Despite this never-ending marathon, A & O continued to forge ahead. The agency developed a new strategic plan that will provide direction over the next three years. The strategic planning process included internal and external stakeholder engagement and a facilitated planning session. A Strategic Planning committee guided the process.

In its 13th year in Winnipeg, Home Instead's Be a Santa to a Senior program delivered over 7,000 gifts to Winnipeg's socially isolated older adults. A & O delivered 2,861 gifts to participants living in the community. Santa came through despite Covid-19!

Staff and members of the Board of Directors attended an Anti-Racism Workshop: Embracing Diversity & Enhancing Cultural Competency. The virtual training focused on capacity building for community members and organizations to create a just, equitable and inclusive society. The training aimed at increasing awareness, educating ourselves and the public on how to dismantle racism while building cultural safety within organizations, the broader community and society.

We are very proud of the agency's staff, volunteers and members of the board of directors for your commitment and dedication to the agency and its work in supporting older Manitobans to age well no matter the circumstances. You are truly exceptional individuals, making us better together!



SAFETY & SECURITY

The agency provides direct **Elder Abuse prevention services** and receives referrals for the following: consulting around Elder Abuse issues, one-on-one support and counselling, Safe Suite Program referrals, communication support group for older parents / grandparents, assistance with Protection Orders and more.

This Full House assists older Winnipeggers living with Hoarding Disorder. Agency Social Workers provide support, counselling, advocacy, access to cleaning and long-term maintenance and follow-up. As a result of the program, clients are able to receive in home services which had previously refused to provide assistance.

The program delivered one **Buried in Treasures** support group with 6 participants. Buried in Treasures is a 15-session group aimed at providing education, support, and realistic strategies for older adults 55+ who struggle with clutter in their homes. In order to comply with COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, the agency delivered this group via conference call.



The agency continues to offer the **Unburied from Treasures (UFT)** group on a monthly basis to clients who have completed the Buried in Treasures group. However, in response to COVID-19, A & O initially offered additional UFT groups on a weekly basis in order to provide additional support to clients. Over 60 clients are invited each month, with an average of 18 clients attending per session.



Older Victim Services assists older Winnipeggers that have been the victim of a crime. Registered Social Workers and trained volunteers provide practical support to clients while they navigate the justice system. Program staff assist clients by providing court updates, assistance in applying for compensation, preparation of Victim Impact Statements and court accompaniment.



This year, the Safe Suite program worked with 33 older adults needing to leave situations of abuse. Individuals and couples, 55 years of age and older, regardless of gender, work with Registered Social Workers on safety planning, counselling and obtaining orders of protection. Four clients entered a Safe Suite during the 2020 – 2021 fiscal year. Clients receive assistance with legal, financial and housing options and received long-term follow up from their Social Workers.

A & O is proud to announce the launch of the newly revised SafetyAid Program. The program will be the first of its kind in Canada!

A new SafetyAid program has been developed and launched through a pilot project. This program has been structured to ensure it fills the community need, and employs best practices in addressing falls prevention. The new SafetyAid program will consist of:

- A Falls risk assessment (Fall Clinic)
- Exercise program •
- Educational sessions •
- Home assessment

The program will be offered to older adults living in Winnipeg, who are 65+. We look forward to sharing more information on this exciting program in the near future!

SENIOR IMMIGRANT SETTLEMENT SERVICES (SISS)

Senior Immigrant Settlement Services (SISS) offers integrated settlement programming and support to older adult immigrants in Winnipeg. In the past year, the program had the pleasure to assist 198 clients with their settlement needs. They came from countries all over the world, to build new lives in Canada.

SISS and several community organizations partnered to celebrate **World Refugee Day** (WRD) with a virtual public awareness event on June 19, 2020. WRD is a day to honour the strength and courage of refugees. This virtual public awareness event provided an opportunity for people to reflect on our shared global responsibility to respond to the devastating forced displacement crisis around the world.



This past year, SISS partnered with **Tech Manitoba** to offer free digital literacy classes online to our clients. They were also able to provide refurbished computers to 33 A & O clients.

SISS partnered with **Mosaic Newcomer Family Resource Network** to deliver the **Grandfriends Program**, which aims to reduce the social isolation of newcomer seniors through intergenerational programming.

SISS continued to partner with **Families Canada** this past year, consulting on the production of Being a Senior in Canada video and delivering two national webinars on the topics of social isolation and technology.

LANGUAGE BUDDY PROGRAM

In an effort to stay connected with clients who were unable to participate in our online classes this year, we began a Language Buddy Program. Clients were matched with a volunteer who speaks their first language, and called once or twice per week for a check-in and support.

Many thanks to our major funder, **Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada**, as well as many community partners for making this program possible.

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Our **Settlement Orientation for Seniors** continued throughout the year. Staff delivered 103 virtual sessions, where participants learned about important settlement topics such as laws, health, safety, housing, transportation, banking and community information. The classes helped 75 newcomer seniors adjust to their new life in Canada and build the confidence needed to participate actively in community life.

Our **English Language Program for Seniors** offered language classes over Zoom throughout the year to sixty-seven older adults. The ELP program helps them develop English language skills and build new friendships with other newcomer seniors in their community.



The **English Conversation Classes** were an opportunity for our participants to improve their English language skills in an informal setting, learn more about settling in Winnipeg and reinforce the information they received in the group orientation. Additionally, participants develop meaningful relationships with other older adult newcomers and members of their new communities.

Thanks to our wonderful team of volunteer facilitators!

The SISS Settlement Worker provided settlement assistance to our clients in order to help them integrate into the community. They performed a wide variety of tasks, including assisting clients to book vaccine appointments and conducting virtual visits. They also supported clients in navigating systems and facilitating access to community resources through internal and external referrals. Group presentations were organized in response to the needs of the clients on the topics of winter safety, falls prevention, taxes and Covid-19.

During the Covid-19 pandemic, the **Senior Centre Without Walls** program is more important than ever before in providing meaningful opportunities for social engagement among older Manitobans. This program is the first of its kind in Canada and offers a unique opportunity for socially isolated older adults, 55+, to join interactive and educational programs from the comfort of their own homes.

The participants contribute to program planning through regular meetings. Popular sessions offered include Art Therapy, Music Therapy, mental wellness presentations from the Manitoba Psychological Society, book clubs and support groups.

The agency offered two virtual bereavement support groups via zoom.

The **Housing Program**'s personalized consultations provide housing information and tips on how to navigate the Winnipeg housing market. Clients are educated about the different levels of housing available, including Independent Living, Assisted Living, Supportive Housing and Personal Care Homes. The program also provided presentations on housing options to community groups.

The **Winnipeg Housing Directory for Older Adults** is a comprehensive guide of housing options including, rental and utility costs as well as building security and amenities. The guide is available on our website or for purchase through A & O.

This past year, the **Caregiving with Confidence** program had over 360 contacts with clients, services providers and family members. The program provided over 225 hours of volunteer telephone support to those providing care to an older adult. A & O: Support Services for Older Adults was excited to partner again this year with Home Instead's **Be A Santa to A Senior** Program. Due to the pandemic and increased feelings of isolation and need, A & O surpassed all previous year's gifts, and provided 2,861 gift requests to older adults in the community. In partnership with Home Instead, over 7,000 gifts were delivered in total.

Be a Santa to a Senior is an initiative of Home Instead, A & O has been a proud community partner of the program since it began in 2007.

In addition, the agency provided information to over 10 individuals through one outreach opportunity at events such as health and wellness fairs.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, **Income Tax Clinics** were cancelled and clients were referred to other clinics in the community.

A & O continued to refer clients needing **Legal Services** to the office of Boni Singbeil Stienstra LLP.

Strategic Plan 2020 - 2024

To provide direction over the next three years, A & O: Support Services for Older Adults engaged in a strategic planning process that included internal and external stakeholder engagement and a facilitated planning session. The process was guided by a Strategic Planning Committee.

Stakeholder engagement, including an online survey with current staff, board and external stakeholders provided feedback on the current mission statement, internal strengths and challenges; external risks or opportunities that may impact the organization; and critical issues to consider moving forward.

A full day facilitated planning session provided an opportunity for board and staff leadership to reflect on the organization's long-term impact, organizational goals and objectives, and strategic priorities. The planning session was informed by data gathered from the internal and external stakeholders, including identified strengths, challenges, and strategic issues.

Based on the information gathered during the planning session, a draft framework comprising of long-term impact statements, goals, objectives, strategic priorities with benchmarks, and organizational values was developed.

This strategic plan will inform the development of an operational plan and quarterly reporting to measure progress on the strategic plan.
