

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# Support Services for Older Adults

## **MESSAGE FROM BOARD CHAIR & CEO**

As a specialized service provider for older Manitobans, we are pleased to present the 2021-2022 Annual Report, which highlights some of our accomplishments over the past year. We continue to build on our pillars of service, Safety & Security, Social Engagement and Counselling.

The agency is pleased to welcome you to our new home located at 200-207 Donald Street, in the heart of Downtown Winnipeg! We are excited to continue to be located centrally and accessible to the public. This new bright space has allowed us to continue to provide essential programs and services both virtually and in-person to older Manitobans. Thank you to the board of directors and staff for your tireless efforts to make this move happen.

For yet another year, agency staff, board and volunteers have rallied and demonstrated exceptional leadership in providing support to older Manitobans in aging well during a lengthy pandemic and relentless winter. These challenges further compounded the effects of social isolation and pre-existing issues that many people faced. Due to population aging, we have known that the agency's programs and services are critical in supporting older people in aging well. This has been reinforced further through Statistics Canada's recent report where it states that from 2016 to 2021, the number of persons aged 65 and older rose 18.3% to 7.0 million. This is the second largest increase in 75 years. The 7 million people aged 65 and older in 2021 represent nearly 1 in 5 Canadians (19.0%). Older Canadians are a growing economic and politically influential group. We should be celebrating that people are living longer, hearing their voices, allocating the necessary resources, and developing policies to ensure that people are supported to age well in their communities for as long as they choose. Aging is a shared experience, we cannot "other" aging. We have a responsibility to ensure that people have options in relation to how they want to age.

The agency continued to support older people during the COVID-19 pandemic through the delivery of specialized programs and services including the 311 Food Security Line, Senior Centre Without Walls, virtual Senior Immigrant Settlement Services' classes and settlement support as well as the distribution of Wellness Kits. This innovative programming is critical as it provides access to healthy food; wellness supplies and opportunities for meaningful social engagement that let older people know they are not alone.

Knowing that the agency's programs and services provide support and opportunities for growth gives meaning to the challenges we've faced and provides a sense of progress that has helped us stay engaged over the long-term. We appreciate your continued support through the pandemic and are grateful for the older people we serve and the multifaceted communities they belong to.

# AFETY & SECURITY

**NSELLING** 

## **OUR THREE PILLARS**

Our pillars were selected to identify the most important issues and areas of opportunity affecting older adults. Through offering these innovative programs and services, A & O is able to continue to assist older Manitobans to live well.

The agency's **counselling** services provides individual and group counselling to older adults 55+. This past year, the program received over 175 new referrals/intake calls and worked

with an average of 88 past clients each month. Focus areas included bereavement, loneliness, depression, family conflict and others.

The agency offered two virtual bereavement support groups via zoom.

HOUSING PROGRAM provided **1,061** housing consultations The **Housing Program**'s personalized consultations provide housing information and tips on how to navigate the Winnipeg housing market. Clients are educated about the different levels of housing available, including Independent Living, Assisted Living, Supportive Housing and Personal Care Homes.

The **Winnipeg Housing Directory for Older Adults** is a comprehensive housing guide that lists options including, rental and utility costs as well as building security and amenities.

## **CAREGIVING WITH CONFIDENCE**

This past year, the **Caregiving with Confidence** program had over 330 contacts with clients, service providers and family members. The program provided over 210 hours of volunteer telephone support to those providing care to an older adult. In addition, over 35 support groups were delivered to caregivers who are providing support to their loved ones.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, **Income Tax Clinics** were cancelled and clients were referred to other clinics in the community.

A & O continued to refer clients needing **Legal Services** to the office of Boni Singbeil Stienstra LLP.

**This Full House** assists older Winnipeggers living with Hoarding Disorder. Social Workers provide support, counselling, advocacy, access to cleaning and long-term maintenance and follow-up. As a result of the program, clients can receive in home services which had previously refused to provide assistance. Clients become engaged in their community and social networks.

The program delivered two Buried in Treasures support

groups. Buried in Treasures is a 15-session group that provides education, support, and strategies for older people 55+ struggling with clutter in their homes. This group was facilitated virtually in order to comply with COVID-19 restrictions.

The agency continues to offer the Unburied from Treasures (UFT) group monthly to clients who have completed the Buried in Treasures group. Over 60 clients are invited each month, with an average of 18 clients attending per session.

## **ELDER ABUSE PREVENTION SERVICES**

1,030 hours spent for elder abuse related work

288 clients assisted The agency provides direct **Elder Abuse prevention services** and receives referrals for the following: consulting around Elder Abuse issues, one-on-one support and counselling, Safe Suite Program referrals, communication support group for older parents / grandparents, assistance with Protection Orders and more.

## **ELDER ABUSE RELATED PROJECT**

This last fiscal year A & O was proud to partner with Dr. Kerstin Roger (University of Manitoba), her team including partners from Saskatchewan and Alberta, as well as other community agencies in the Prairie provinces to assist with a research study conducted on under reporting of abuse of community residing older adults living in the Prairie Provinces (funded by PrairieAction Foundation).

Through this partnership, the video Who should I tell? was created to help increase the awareness of elder abuse. This video has been translated into French, Tagalog, German and Punjabi. The focus is on Who should I tell? to promote talking about the issue of elder abuse and disclosure by older adults, family and friends. Tip sheets were created for families, older adults and service providers, they are available in three different languages.

## **OLDER VICTIM SERVICES**



**Older Victim Services** assists older Winnipeggers that have been the victim of a crime. Registered Social Workers and trained volunteers provide practical support to clients while they navigate the justice system. Staff assist clients by providing court updates, assistance in applying for compensation, preparation of Victim Impact Statements and court accompaniment.

" I know I am getting better because I am less focused on what happened and beginning to feel curious and interested in things again... moving out of helplessness, feeling more empowered. ## **SAFE SUITE PROGRAM**

assisted 48 older adults experiencing abuse Individuals and couples, 55 years of age and older, regardless of gender, work with Registered Social Workers on safety planning, counselling and obtaining orders of protection. Three clients entered a Safe Suite during the 2021 – 2022 fiscal year. Clients receive assistance with legal, financial and housing options and received long-term follow up from their Social Workers.

## **SAFETYAID: FALLS PREVENTION FOR OLDER MANITOBANS**

A & O launched the new **SafetyAid Program**. The program is the first of its kind in Canada!

This program has been structured to ensure it both fills a community need and employs best practices in addressing falls prevention. The new SafetyAid program consists of:

- A Falls risk assessment (Fall Clinic)
- Exercise program
- Educational sessions
- Home assessment

The program is available to older Winnipeggers 65+.

## **COMMUNITY OUTREACH**

A & O provides educational presentations to community groups seeking information on various aspects of aging. The agency provided information to over 120 individuals through two outreach opportunities at events such as health and wellness fairs. 587 individuals reached

## **SENIOR IMMIGRANT SETTLEMENT SERVICES**

**Senior Immigrant Settlement Services (SISS)** offers integrated settlement programming and support to older immigrants in Winnipeg. The program assisted 170 clients with their settlement needs. They came from countries all over the world, to build new lives in Canada.

Newcomer communities were disproportionately affected by the pandemic in terms of job loss, the technological divide, and many other inequities. Our clients told us that SISS helped them feel less alone, gave them a sense of community, and provided them with important information and resources.







ALO Services for Older Adults Thanks to a grant from New Horizons for Seniors, SISS was able to deliver a three-day safety expo in November.

Three presentations were offered each day on the topics of medication safety, personal safety, frauds and scams, and online safety to name a few. All presentations were delivered online due to COVID-19. Tote bags with brochures and safety information, personal alarms and a bagged lunch were delivered to 105 participants. An average of 60 participants attended each presentation.

## LANGUAGE BUDDY PROGRAM

The program matched a trained volunteer with an older person who may have few social or family connections, feels isolated or lonely, or believes they would benefit from increased social interaction. Volunteers provided wellness checks and weekly phone calls to meet the needs of each individual, both were conducted in the client's first language.

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## **SETTLEMENT ORIENTATION FOR SENIORS (SOS)**

120 virtual sessions delivered **Settlement Orientation for Seniors** continued online throughout the year. 120 virtual sessions were delivered, where participants learned about important

settlement topics such as laws, health, safety, housing, transportation, banking and

community information. The classes assisted 78 older newcomers adjust to their new life in Canada.





### **ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROGRAM (ELP)**

The **English Language Program** for Seniors offered language classes over Zoom throughout the year to 86 older adults. The ELP program helps develop English language skills and build new friendships with other older newcomers.

## **ENGLISH CONVERSATION CLASSES (ECC)**

354 virtual and in-person ECC's delivered Thanks to our volunteer facilitators, we were able to deliver 354 virtual and inperson ECCs throughout the year with a total attendance of 422. The ECC's were an opportunity for participants to improve their English language skills



in an informal setting, learn more about settling in Winnipeg and reinforce the information they received in the group orientation.

## **SETTLEMENT WORKER**

The settlement worker provided assistance to clients to help them integrate into the community. They performed a wide variety of tasks, including assisting clients to book vaccine appointments, supporting clients with technology needs and conducting virtual visits. They also supported clients in navigating systems and facilitating access to community resources. Group presentations were organized in response to the needs of the clients on various topics such as winter safety, bone health, falls prevention and taxes. They also partnered with Computers for Life to offer computer literacy classes and organized Language Cafes in Spanish, Punjabi, Hindi and Urdu.

## **SENIOR CENTRE WITHOUT WALLS**

447 sessions held

12,127 participants

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Senior Centre Without Walls (SCWW) program is more important than ever before. This program is the first of its kind in Canada and offers a unique opportunity for socially isolated older adults, 55+, to join interactive, educational programs from the comfort of their own homes. Popular sessions offered include Art Therapy, Music Therapy, mental wellness presentations from the Manitoba Psychological Society, book clubs and support groups.

## **CONNECT PROGRAM**

101 volunteers provided 5,252 hours

- worked with 382 socially isolated older adults
- 269 ongoing clients
- 113 new referrals

Registered Social Workers connect clients to resources that facilitate meaningful social connections. Over 84 clients are matched with volunteer visitors for for scheduled community visits. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, most clients received calls through the Phone-a-Friend Program.

## CONNECT CONVERSATION GROUPS

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the agency offered the Connect Conversation Group. This group is offered four times a week to clients currently on the program wait list. This group is led by agency volunteers and staff. These groups provide an opportunity to chat about topics of the day, provide tools to address anxiety and has a variety of guest speakers. Five volunteers facilitated 155 group sessions.

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## **BE A SANTA TO A SENIOR**

A & O: Support Services for Older Adults was excited to partner again this year with Home Instead's Be A Santa to A Senior Program. A & O provided 2,450 gift requests to older adults in the community. In partnership with Home Instead, a total of over 5,000 gifts were delivered.





Be a Santa to a Senior is an initiative of Home Instead, A & O has been a proud community partner since it began in 2007.

A & O would like to thank the many donors, the Winnipeg Police Service for delivering gifts and the schools, daycares and families who made cards to be included with the gifts.

**3,490** food hampers delivered Older Winnipeggers in need of food security assistance during this trying time, can call 311 to be connected with a number of resources available through A & O, including assistance securing a food hamper, options for grocery delivery, access to A & O's specialized social services and more.

## WELLNESS KITS

In response to COVID-19, A & O and its partners provided Wellness kits to at risk / vulnerable older adults in the Community.

## **STAFF PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT**

#### Anti-Racism Workshop: Embracing Diversity & Enhancing Cultural Competency

A & O was able to offer virtual training to all staff in May 2021. The training focused on capacity building for organizations to create a just, equitable and inclusive society. It provided a safe space for candid discussion about incidences of racism and the impact of colonization. It also aimed to increase awareness on how to dismantle racism while building cultural safety within organizations, the broader communities, and our society.

#### Addressing the Impact of (dis)Stress, Burnout and Vicarious Trauma in Service Providers

Service providers, caregivers and community leaders have been working tirelessly to meet the evolving needs of clients and community in new and meaningful ways since the onset of COVD-19. The Workplace Safety and Health Committee offered this session to all staff on February 16, 2022. The session invited dialogue to share experiences to recognize the successes and hardships of these unprecedented times.
